Joseph Fisher, Thomas Wadley, William Wadley, Joseph Blissett, John Filbee, Benwell Eggleton, William Pratt, and John Poulton, were indicted for destroying a thrashing machine on the 21st of November, the property of Thomas Newton, of Bensington. This trial, from the circumstance of Counsel being employed on both sides, occupied the Court several hours. It appeared from the evidence, that on Sunday morning the 21st of November, a crowd of persons assembled in the church yard at Benson, from whence they went to the prosecutor's house at Crowmarsh, armed with bludgeons and sticks. Thomas Wadley, Fisher, Filbee, Blissett, William Wadley, and Eggleton, were proved to be present; the gates of Mr. Newton's yard were pushed open, and Mr. N. came out, when the mob said they were going to break his machine—that they wanted 2s. per day, and they would have it. Mr. Newton replied “if you will let it stand another week, I'll give you a barrel of beer.” In consequence of this they went towards the public-house, but soon returned. Mr. Newton's son recommended them to be peaceable, and not to make a disturbance on the sabbath day, the mob at that time consisted of about 500; they then went to the sick yard, and began to destroy the machine. Newton and his son were present, and the former said if they would let the machine alone he would have it taken to pieces on Monday morning. The mob ultimately broke the machine to pieces, and afterwards went to the public-house and had the barrel of beer. The prosecutor underwent a cross-examination by Mr. Walesby, principally for the purpose of eliciting the fact that the crowd assembled in the church yard on Sunday, not with the premeditated purpose of machine breaking, but on account of Mr. Newton being about to give notice of applying to Parliament for an Act to enclose the parish of Benson, a circumstance which it is well known did not add to his popularity in that neighbourhood. The prisoners were all found guilty; and the Court, considering that the conduct of some of them was much more violent than others, sentenced them as follow:—Joseph Fisher, Thomas Wadley, Wm. Wadley, and John Poulton, to be transported for seven years; and Joseph Blissett, John Filbee, Benwell Eggleton, and Wm. Pratt, 12 months' imprisonment in the house of correction, and kept to hard labour.

WATER VESTRY.
The second vestry was held at the National School-room, on Tuesday evening last, when a very large number attended, and no business interest seemed to be taken in respect to review things in connection with the parish. The Vice (Mr. J. H. Field) took the chair, and those who were present Messrs. W. Stenton, A. G. Field, J. West, J. H. Painter, William Thompson, W. Littleboy, J. Walter, J. H. Field, W. and D. Lewis, W. S. Gossler, Halford, Payson, T. Smith, J. Smith, T. Hall, W. Jackson, D. Johnson, Mr. G. Davis, &c.

The Chairman read the notice of meeting, viz., "To audit the Churchwardens' accounts, and appoint Churchwardens for the coming year." He read the accounts and receipts for the year, and a discussion followed, but eventually Mr. W. Thompson proposed, and Mr. T. Smith seconded, that the accounts be passed, which was carried unanimously. The Vice then again asked Mr. A. G. Field to be Churchwarden.

The Chairman then asked them to appoint the Parish Wardens. Mr. Gossler said he was pleased to have the opportunity of again proposing Mr. J. West; when he asked him to serve before he had difficulty in persuading him, but he had the pleasure now of saying that everything had been done well since Mr. West had been in office, and that he had attended strictly to his duties, and had done his best to keep things in order. Mr. Littleboy seconded the nomination, which was carried unanimously.

Mr. A. G. Field then rose and stated that he must resign his office unless Mr. West would give his assurance that, as a resident in the parish, he would leave that office in connection with his other, for he could not be legally employed and engaged. Some little difficulty was now found in getting another candidate, but eventually the Rev. G. J. Davis consented to be nominated, and said that if elected he would, though unworthily, accept the office. Mr. A. G. Field then proposed, and Mr. T. Smith seconded, that the Rev. G. J. Davis be the Parish Churchwarden, which was carried.

The Allotment Warden's accounts, which were allowed to stand over from the Lady Day vestry, were now read over. The £15.50 income tax, having been adjusted to by the vestry, the Warden was instructed to find out if this was a legal claim. The accounts were passed. It was stated that there was £15.00 out owing, but that the Warden was now in a position to reduce the price of the land to £10.00 for two years, and let it at £14.00 per pole.

The result of the enquiry to the Charity Commissioners, which was presented at the last vestry is not yet complete, and the Chairman of Benchy promised to post when known in various parts the land result of legal changes on the two acres of allotment land from the Charity Commissioners.

The Warden's new brought to the notice of the vestry the complaint he had made at the last vestry respecting the enclosing of a road, as part of road, by low railings in front of Benson Mill. Mr. Slade was represented by Mr. Halford, solicitor, of Wallingford, and Mr. Painter by Mr. G. Davis, of Wallingford. A resolution having been put to the vestry that Mr. Slade be requested to get the low railings back into position, without enclosing a road, consented to do so.

Inquest.—The Coroner (H. Dixon, Esq.), held an inquiry touching the death of Edward Thomas Watts, aged 18, by drowning at Benson, on Thursday the 12th inst.—Albert Henwood, of St. John's Wood, London, was first called. He said at 8.15 on Thursday we were bathing in the River Thames near the horse ferry. Edward went in first and swam half way across and back again, when he helped me (as I cannot swim) by holding me up. He then swam quite across, and rested on the ferry boat; he called across to say it was muddy, and after resting he jumped in again, swam two-thirds the way across, when he called for help. Henry Lomax, a bargeman, went to his assistance. I went in up to my neck, but was then two feet from him. Henry Lomax then jumped in with some things on, as he had been in and was dressing, but seemed out of breath, as he had run some hundred yards, divesting himself of his clothes in running; he caught his hand, and they both went under; when the bargeman came up he was bluey-red and bad.—Henry Lomax, of Reading, corroborated the previous witness's statement, but said he was pulled under, and had some difficulty in extricating himself as the drowning man clutched him, and when I came up I know I was exhausted.—By a Juror: Do you really mean to say that having one hand free you could not have saved the man.—Witness: No, I did the best I could and could do no more.—The Coroner: We ought to be pleased we have one inquest instead of two.—Henry Whitehead, lock-keeper, said he was called at 8.30 to bring a punt and drags; he found the body at 10.10 a.m.; there were deep holes about, and the drag must have passed over the body, as he found it in the same place pointed out to him by Henry Lomax.—The Jury were of opinion that Edward T. Watts was exhausted, and gave a verdict of "Accidentally drowned while bathing." Some of the Jury expressed an opinion that Henry Lomax should be commended for his conduct and risk of life, and the Coroner appended the following:—"That the Jury wish to commend your conduct in risking your life to save that of a fellow creature and with difficulty saved yourself, and trust you will be rewarded for so doing." The fees paid to the Jury were given to the Cottage Hospital, Wallingford, viz., 8s.

THE FLOWER SHOW.

Like other local shows the long drought was responsible for the diminution in the number of exhibits at the annual show of the above society, held in the beautiful grounds of Colne House on Wednesday, but despite this drawback, which was naturally expected, the exhibits were up to their usual standard of excellence, and reflected great credit particularly on the cultivators of the village. The judges were Mr. J. Seymour, Mr. Greet, and Mr. Dent. The show was very keen, and was judged by Mrs. T. P. Wells and Miss Allen. Although the exhibits were not for competition there were several fine specimens of plants and flowers on the show, which were adjudged upon by Mr. J. Seymour. OXFORD CITY SESSIONS.

The General Quarter Sessions of the Peace for this City were held on Monday last, before William Elias Esquire, Esq. the Recorder, Mr. Alderman Cox, Thomas Robinson, Wm. S. Smith, Thomas Huxworth, H. F. Cox, Esq., and other City Magistrates. The Mayor was present, standing in consequence of the death of a relative. The following are the only cases that came before the Court, viz:—

Henry Cook and William Cook, indicted for stealing on the 1st of May last, in the parish of All Saints, in this city, 80 lbs. weight of beef and 4 lbs. of mutton, the property of Mr. John Prior; and John Adams, charged with having received part of this meat, knowing it to have been stolen.

Mr. Prior, the prosecutor, who is a butcher, residing in this city, stated that in consequence of the shop which he occupies being in the open part of the market, he was part of a shop of Mr. John Cook (of Westbury's) for the purpose of looking up his meat at night, when he leaves the market; that on the evening of Friday the 1st of May last he got a large quantity of meat from Mr. Cook's shop, and that on the following morning, when he delivered the shop, he noticed about 10 lbs. of beef and a piece of mutton; that he gave immediate information of his loss to the City Constable, who, in the course of two or three hours, brought several pieces of beef to witness, which he compared with the beef in his possession, and which meat he found he was entitled to recover to him the same as the mutton in which it had been separated from the part left behind in the shop. On Wednesday the 3rd of May Mr. Prior went with the Constable, the Recorder, Messrs. Wallingford, to the house of William Cook, the father of Mr. John Cook, who was the master of the shop, and there they found several pieces of beef, which they brought away, and which, upon comparison with the beef found by the other Constable, were found to tally exactly.

James Druce, the City Constable, stated that he, in company with Robert and Henry, immediately searched the house of the prisoner Adams, in St. Thomas's parish, and there also and two or three in the morning of Saturday the 6th of May, and that in a hole under the stairs they found a number of pieces of meat, consisting of beef and mutton, and part of a piece of mutton in a box in the bed room, all of which they brought away.

Thomas Prior, a butcher, lived in May last at Mr. Lang's, in St. Thomas's parish. The prisoner Cook lodged in the same house, and slept in the same room as witness. Cook first came to sleep there on Thursday the 28th of April, but did not sleep there the following night (Friday). Witness got up about half past five on the Sunday morning, and went in the house of the prisoner Adams, about his usual distance, to light his pipe, when he saw John Adams and Cook, and another young man whom he did not know.

Mr. Prior, immediately produced the mutton and beef found in Adams's house on the 6th of May. (The said witness went to Kensington, to the house of Mrs. Cook, grandmother of the prisoner Wm. Cook, where he found a small piece of beef and a bit of mutton, which he brought with him, and gave to Mr. Prior.) This witness also testified to evidence in support of his journey in Southwark, as stated by Mr. Prior.

James Gossard Esq. (the Recorder's clerk) knows the prisoner Cook; remembers his being at his father's house about four months ago in a white flag, which, indeed, he left as his house for two days, and then stayed at a shop I should know it again; the father found in Adams's house being put into his hands, and that Cook's room to his being the father in which Cook had brought the mutton, from his having seen while he was on one side of it.

John Cook is a butcher, residing at Westbury, and owns a shop in Oxford market, part of which he lets to Mr. John Prior to look up his meat in. On the morning of Saturday, May 28, witness carried a small piece of meat, which he had looked in the shop the preceding Wednesday. He only noticed the mutton taken to the shop. The clerk found by the evidence of John Adams's house being found in witness, he might have seen it as belonging to him, from his having his father's J. L. to see witness, John Adams (a blacksmith), and then in St. Thomas's; knows the prisoner William Cook, who notified for witness at the time of the robbery in question; recollects Cook having a slice of him, for the purpose, as he said, of taking meat from his Kensington. On Saturday morning, May 28, witness went to his shop soon after five, and when about the five observed something in a shop near the hall door. Cook being then in the shop, witness asked him what it was, who replied that it was his meat, which he was going to take to Kensington. Witness, at this moment, only one of the meat that day, and gave it in the parlour in the evening, who carried every part of it, and left the remainder with witness, telling him to do what he liked with it. The quantity was left with about 10 lbs. of beef and mutton, part of which he carried, and gave the rest to his father in St. Thomas's parish of Southwark.

John Cook lives at 10, St. Martin's, near Kensington. In witness the prisoner William Cook lodged. About the end of last April witness met a man by the prisoner Cook in St. Martin's, and when he returned home that night he told Mr. Druce (witness and Mr. Gossard) a lot of what he had seen. On Saturday night, May 28, a little before ten, the prisoner Cook brought home with him two pieces of meat and a piece of mutton, saying that his master (Adams) had sent the meat and that he had brought the others. One of the pieces of meat and the mutton were afterwards delivered to witness, who consumed.

David Druce, Esq. (a Magistrate) was in Oxford on Saturday, May 28; on the following Tuesday he received of his son in law four pieces of meat, which he took home; the next day Mr. Prior and witness, the recorder, went to his house for the meat, which he gave to them.

The prisoner was all found guilty, and sentenced by the Court as follows, viz:—Henry Cook and William Cook to be imprisoned for 7, and John Adams (the mother) for 14 years.
